Community Development Program

The City's Community Development (CD) Program provides operating and one-time grants to non-profit organizations to improve the quality of life for Santa Monica residents, with an emphasis on those who are low or moderate income or have special needs. Target populations include: children, teens, families, seniors, people with disabilities, and people who are homeless in Santa Monica. The FY 2009-10 CD Program provides funding support of approximately \$7.8 million to 27 nonprofit human service and housing development organizations supporting over 50 different programs. Programs may serve multiple target populations. In addition, \$791,000 in one-time grants supports capital and infrastructure improvement and projects to improve service delivery.

Note: The *Program/Project Descriptions* indicate the activities of the specific programs funded through the City's Community Development Program only.

Program Description:

- a. **Coordinated Case Management:** The program provides coordinated case management services to homeless clients including substance abuse and dependency treatment, job and housing placement, and social service referrals. **Grant Award: \$99,733**

- b. **Homeless Community Court (Beds):** The program, through County and City funding, provides a minimum of three substance abuse treatment beds year round for participants enrolled in the Santa Monica Homeless Community Court. The program, in conjunction with Court personnel, the City's Resource Coordinator, and other program partners, will assist participants in assessing resources including shelter beds, permanent housing vouchers, psychiatric care and intensive case management to increase the likelihood of chronically homeless individuals establishing and maintaining life off the streets of Santa Monica. **Grant Award: \$20,000**

- c. **Serial Inebriate Outreach:** The program provides outreach services to in-custody chronic inebriate arrestees detained for public intoxication. The target population includes chronically homeless individuals identified by the Homeless Liaison Program (HLP) Team, Human Services Division, those on the Santa Monica Service Registry and those identified by the Homeless Community Court Team. **Grant Award: \$46,643**

- d. **Integrated Women's Recovery Center:** The program rehabilitates an existing residential facility located at 844 Pico Boulevard in Santa Monica for use as a 36-bed, fully integrated Women's Recovery Center, for substance abuse and dependence recovery – as they make final transition from homelessness to independent living. **Grant Award: \$255,000 (FY 2007-10 One-Time Funding)**

COMMON GROUND – THE WESTSIDE HIV COMMUNITY CENTER

The Center provides comprehensive HIV services to Westside residents: case management, links to medical services, emergency motel and food vouchers and independent living skill-building for people with HIV/AIDS. Program Description: a. **Chronic Homeless Program and Homeless Community Court--Assertive Case Management Teams:** The program provides assertive outreach and intensive case management to chronically homeless persons in the CHP Assertive Case Management and Homeless Community Court

Programs. The teams will target chronically homeless high users of resources/services in Santa Monica and other chronically homeless individuals identified by the Santa Monica Police Department Homeless Liaison Program (HLP) Team, Human Services Division, those on the Santa Monica Service Registry and those identified by the Homeless Community Court Team. Targeted clients include serial inebriates, substance abusers and individuals with mental illness. Services include outreach, assessment, transportation to and from Court, housing placement, post-placement/retention services, primary health care, money management, intensive case management, substance abuse treatment and linkages to mental health treatment through the DMH appointed Court psychiatrist. **Grant Award: \$304,632**

- b. **Coordinated Case Management>Showers:** The program identifies the comprehensive needs of homeless individuals, develops individualized case management plans to address those needs, and provides treatment and support to help homeless people off the streets and into stable housing. Services include outreach, assessment, housing placement, and intensive case management including linkages to mental health and substance abuse treatment, primary health care, and employment. **Grant Award: \$65,776**

- c. **Family Self Sufficiency:** The program assists families participating in the Santa Monica Housing Authority-Section 8 housing in achieving economic independence from government assistance and securing a living wage within five years. The program offers education, training and employment, childcare, transportation, and other services for all members of participating Section 8 families. **Grant Award: \$174,353**

- d. **Shelter Plus Care Program:** The program assists homeless persons with disabilities, including mental illness or substance abuse, obtain and maintain housing through the provision of comprehensive case management services and rental assistance. Clients are assisted with permanent housing placement and

receive regular agency- and home-based case management focused on housing retention. **Grant Award: \$38,950**

- a. **Agency-Based Community Support:** The program provides agency-based support for intake and referral program, long term counseling and case management services to low-income adults, children and families targeting those that are uninsured for long-term support and for short term or one-time assistance. **Grant Award: \$62,013**

- b. **Muir/McKinley Elementary School-Based:** The program offers counseling, case management and consultation to teachers at John Muir and McKinley Elementary Schools. Program Description: a. **WISE Adult Day Care:** The program provides adult day care services to low-income seniors/older adults with moderate to severe dementia, including persons with Alzheimer's disease, frail seniors, those with mild memory loss, Parkinson's disease and/or stroke sequelae. Services include music and art therapy, exercise, inter-generational programming, community education and respite and support for caregivers. **Grant Award: \$130,175**

b. **Care Management**
The program provides case management services to low-income Santa Monica seniors. Services include an in-home psycho-social assessment, development of an individualized care plan that includes purchases of services necessary to maintain the client in his or her home, referrals to other agencies and programs for necessary services and continual monitoring of the client for their needs. **Grant Award: \$205,103**

- c. **Congregate Meals:** The program provides a nutritional, hot meal to seniors five days per week at three sites and six days at the Senior Recreation Center, which includes a sack lunch on Saturdays. Meal reimbursement is provided by the Los Angeles County Area Agency on Aging, and City General Fund dollars cover staffing and supplies through this grant. In addition to the basic meal service which will serve up to 29,110 meals annually, the agency offers educational programming to the participants of the congregated meal program at the various sites. **Grant Award: \$231,340**
- d. **Expanding Access to Health Services for Seniors:** The program provides a range of services to cohesively support frail and elderly clients, including individual and family counseling and support groups, caregiving and family support services, and a collaborative partnership with Santa Monica physicians providing psychosocial assessments and linkages to in-home and community services. Agency will be exploring viability of establishing a “Village Model” a virtual one-stop shop modeled after the Beacon Hill community established in Boston, MA. **Grant Award: \$91,328**
- e. **Paratransit**
The program provides transportation and supports seniors remaining in their homes including outreach and education services related to transportation options for clients with disabilities. Services include intakes, monthly group classes and community education. WISE & Healthy Aging will continue to work in partnership with the Big Blue Bus to provide transportation and door-through-door services. **Grant Award: \$188,600**
- f. **Daily Money Management:** The program provides bill paying, representative payee assistance, and related services to older Santa Monica adults (including Spanish-speaking seniors) with the primary goal of improving quality of life and helping isolated, low-income, frail clients remain living independently. **Grant Award: \$46,535**

- g.
