- a. **Employment Program for Homeless and Low-Income individuals:** The program provides comprehensive employment assistance to 500 Santa Monica homeless and low-income residents. **Grant Award: \$238,300.**
- b. **HUD Supportive Housing Program:** Provides job development and case management services to expand employment opportunities for 70 homeless persons per year, with the overall goal of helping participants achieve housing stability and increase self-reliance. **Grant Award: \$36,686**

- a. **Coordinated Case Management:** The program provides coordinated case management services to 86 homeless clients including substance abuse and dependency treatment, job and housing placement, and social service referrals. **Grant Award: \$97,300.**
- b. **Homeless Community Court (Beds):** The program provides full time staff for Santa Monica Jail outreach

and dedicates a minimum of four substance abuse treatment beds year round for 15 participants enrolled in the Santa Monica Homeless Community Court. The program will introduce chronically homeless individuals into the Homeless Community Court system and in conjunction with Court personnel, the City's Resource Coordinator, and other program partners, will assist participants in assessing resources including shelter beds, permanent housing vouchers, psychiatric care and intensive case management to increase the likelihood of chronically homeless individuals establishing and maintaining life off the streets of Santa Monica. **Grant Award: \$141,700.**

- c. **Integrated Women's Recovery Center:** The program rehabilitates an existing residential facility located at 844 Pico Boulevard in Santa Monica for use as a 36-bed, fully integrated Women's Recovery Center, for substance abuse and dependence recovery – as they make final transition from homelessness to independent living. **Grant Award: \$255,000.**
- d. **Serial Inebriate Outreach:** The program provides outreach services to 325 in-custody arrestees including serial inebriates and others with chronic substance abuse issues during the final hour of detention at the Santa Monica Police Department. **Grant Award: \$37,700.**

Services also include 1) provider support and training workshops; 2) participation in the LA County *Steps to Excellence* Pilot, designed to improve the quality of childcare services through a new tiered reimbursement program. Program Description:

- a. **Assertive Case Management Team – Homeless Community Court:** The program provides assertive case management to a minimum of 55 chronically homeless participants in the Homeless Community Court. In conjunction with Court personnel, the City’s Resource Coordinator, and other program partners, the assertive case management team will introduce 120 unduplicated chronically homeless individuals into the Homeless Community Court system and assist participants to assess resources including shelter beds, substance abuse recovery beds, permanent housing vouchers, and psychiatric care. Services include outreach, assessments, housing placement, post-placement/retention services, and intensive case management including linkages to mental health and substance abuse treatment, primary health care, and money management. **Grant Award: \$134,700.**

- b. **Chronic Homeless Program Assertive Case Management Team:** Outreach to and assess 40 chronically homeless persons for participation in the CHP Assertive Case Management Program. It provides access to a comprehensive range of services to include case management, rental assistance, housing assistance and other targeted interventions. The team targets chronically homeless high utilizers of resources/services in Santa Monica and other chronically homeless individuals identified by City staff, local businesses, or social service agencies. Targeted clients include inebriates, addicts and individuals with mental illness. Services include outreach, assessments, housing placement, post-placement/

retention services, and intensive case management including linkages to mental health and substance abuse treatment, primary health care, and money management. **Grant Award: \$168,100.**

- c. **Coordinated Case Management>Showers:** The program identifies the comprehensive needs of homeless individuals, develops individualized case management plans to address those needs, and provides treatment and support to help homeless people off the streets and into stable housing. Services include outreach, assessments, housing placement, and intensive case management including linkages to mental health and substance abuse treatment, primary health care, and employment to 120 participants. **Grant Award: \$76,200.**

- d. **Family Self Sufficiency:** The program assists 130 families participating in the Santa Monica Housing Authority-Section 8 housing in achieving economic independence from government assistance and securing a living wage within five years. The program offers education, training and employment, childcare, transportation, and other services for all members of participating Section 8 families. **Grant Award: \$170,000.**

- e. **Shelter Plus Care Program:** The program assists homeless persons with disabilities, including mental illness or substance abuse, obtain and maintain housing through the provision of comprehensive case management services and rental assistance. Forty-one (41) clients are assisted with permanent housing placement and receive regular agency- and home-based case management focused on housing retention. **Grant Award: \$38,000.**

HUD Supportive Housing Program (SHP): Provides case management services to 41 homeless participants annually. **Grant Award: \$60,758.**

- a. **Agency-Based Community Support:** The program provides agency-based support for intake and referral program, long term counseling and case management services to 80 low-income adults, children and families targeting those that are uninsured for long-term support and for short term or one-time assistance. **Grant Award: \$60,500.**
